

WELCOME! During this 3-week-long <u>Season of Creation: TREES</u> we're exploring the connection between forest ecology and our Christian faith.

EMBEDDED IN OUR LITURGY is a conversation with <u>Lynda Mapes</u>, <u>Seattle Times</u> environmental reporter and author of <u>Witness Tree</u>: <u>Seasons of Change with a Century-Old Oak</u>.

As a newspaper reporter, Lynda was looking for a fresh way to understand and tell the climate-change story "beyond dueling politics or science." A conversation with Andrew Richardson, associate professor at Harvard University, and a subsequent invitation to come to the Harvard Research Forest for a yearlong Bullard Fellowship, gave Lynda the opportunity she craved. She writes:



"Here, at one of the world's premier research forests, in the classic New England village of Petersham, Massachusetts, a new center of my world emerged. In this forest so like the woods I had loved as a girl, it came to me: you could tell the story of climate change—and more—through a single, beloved living thing: a tree."

DURING THIS SEASON we're paying attention to the trees we encounter each day—around our homes, in your neighborhoods and parks—and we invite you to join us! Let's learn together more of what trees and forests have to teach us about living in community and enhancing the livability of the places where we live. Let's get outside and use the <u>Tree Walking Guides</u> provided by the City of Seattle Park Department (available on the Peace website) to view specific species of trees "in person' in West Seattle parks and neighborhoods; let's humbly open ourselves to what we might learn!

ON THE FINAL SUNDAY, JUNE 28, we'll learn the story of how one ancient Douglas Fir inspired the writing of a song and how, as a result of that creative process, <u>The Tree</u>, has taken on a life of its own. Our Live Stream Worship will include a special VIRTUAL performance of <u>The Tree</u>, arranged and produced by Bronwyn Edwards for choir, flute, and cello, in which several Peace folk participate.

In addition, <u>Kjerstyn Lindgren</u>, niece of Kevin and Nicole Klinemeier and graduate of Evergreen State University, will lead a 9:00am forum on tips for moving toward a <u>zerowaste</u> lifestyle.

CALL TO WORSHIP

Elizabeth Menstell and Tyler Coyle lead the Call to Worship this morning from Volunteer Park. Crush and rub a sprig of cedar or rosemary between your fingers and take in the aroma. Cedar is a sacred tree in this part of the world. Rosemary is a symbol of remembrance.

- Come, Creator, Mother and Father of all, come unite with Earth community around the sacred tree of life, and help us remember anew:
 The first fresh breath of life, the first hint of your presence, the first song in the dawn that opened our souls to you and taught us to celebrate.

- Come, compassionate Christ,
 come unite with all creation around the ancient tree of healing,
 and help us remember:
 The pains you feel among the suffering poor,
 the hurts you feel when Earth is wounded,

PRAYER OF THE DAY

- P The Creator be with you.
- C And also with you.
- P Let us pray. Creator God,
- We come together to be grounded—as trees are grounded in nourishing soil—in your creation and in your grace. Show us your presence in the trees and forests that surround us and open our eyes to the communities they foster above and below the soil. Teach us to live our lives with loving intention, recognizing our relatedness to all living things. In the name of Christ, through whom all things are reconciled, whether on Earth or in heaven. Amen.

CONFESSION

Our confession this season is framed by words from <u>Laudato Si'</u>, the circular letter from Pope Francis which invites all people into renewed care for our common home.

- P In his beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her.
- C We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air, and in all forms of life.
- P The Earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail."
- C We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the Earth; that our very bodies are made up of her elements: we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters. Forgive our forgetfulness, O God, and give us the will to treat our sister with respect, care, and gratitude.






Pastor Erik Kindem and Marcia Olson interview author Lynda Mapes about her book, Witness Tree: Seasons of Change with a Century-Old Oak.

OFFERTORY PRAYER


- P God, our Creator,

- P The Creator be with you.

- C We open them to God.
- P Let us give thanks to our Creator.
- C It is right to join creation in thanking God.
- P It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, to give thanks to you, generous and loving God. You chose to be born a human being, to become a part of Earth, to suffer, to die, and to be raised from death to redeem humankind, to renew creation, and to reconcile all born of Earth and the Spirit.
- C Your presence is the living impulse in all things, the Christ deep among us, filling every element and place; filling the grain and the grape we share with you this day.
- P Therefore with angels and archangels, saints and sinners, ancient voices in the forest, high voices from the sky, deep voices from the sea, and the whole company of creation, we proclaim your presence among us.
- C Holy, holy! God of all life! Earth and sea and sky are full of your presence and glorify your name! Amen.

EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

- P Blessed are you, O God of the universe, for you entered creation's story in Jesus our brother, embracing life and conquering death, that all creation might be restored. In the night in which he was arrested, Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his followers, saying: (*Lift bread*)
- C Take and eat, this is my body, given for you. Do this to remember me.
- P Again after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: (Lift cup)
- C This cup is the new covenant in my blood, poured out for you and for all for forgiveness and healing. Do this to remember me.



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INVITATION TO COMMUNION

- P As we eat this bread and drink from this cup we remember all the beings with whom we share this planet home, made sacred by the God who is in all things and in whom all things hold together. Taste and see that the Lord is good.
- C God's mercy endures forever!

Take the gifts of bread and wine/juice into your bodies now, whether you are alone or in the company of others, giving thanks for these gifts of grace!

- P Now may the penetrating power of Christ's body and blood reach deep into your heart, your mind, and your body to heal your wounds, and through you bring healing to Earth.
- C Amen.

- P Christ calls you to be his disciples, to serve him with love and compassion, to serve Earth by caring for creation to serve by caring for all creatures.

- C We will care for the trees!
 We will nurture our planet!
 We will care for one another!
 We will celebrate life!
