"Wisdom is a Tree of Life to those who lay hold of her; those who hold her fast are called happy." WELCOME! During this 3-week-long <u>Season of Creation: TREES</u> we're exploring the connection between forest ecology and our Christian faith; we're considering what it means to "walk in sacred manner" upon the Earth.

DURING THIS SEASON we're paying attention to the trees we encounter each day—around our homes, in your neighborhoods and parks—and we invite you to join us! Let's learn together more of what trees and forests have to teach us about living in community and enhancing the livability of the places where we live. Let's get outside, using the TREE WALKING GUIDES provided by the City of Seattle Park Department (available on the Peace website) to view specific species of trees "in person' in West Seattle parks and neighborhoods. Let's READ about the forest communities that function above and below the ground, and the amazing roles trees play in making our planet home more habitable. Let's LISTEN to what Lynda Mapes, author of Witness Tree: Seasons of Change with a Century-Old Oak, has to say about trees and climate change. Let's humbly open ourselves to what we might learn.

ON THIS THIRD AND FINAL SUNDAY OF OUR SERIES, we'll be introduced to two marvelous hymns by Susan Palo Cherwien and become privy to images and art that embroider the overall message; and we'll learn how one ancient Douglas fir tree inspired the writing of a song that has taken on a life of its own. Songwriter Dana Lyons relates his story:

"A few years ago, while recovering from a back injury, I went camping in the Olympic Rain Forest. For four relaxing days I read and played my guitar at the base of an ancient Douglas fir. As I was packing up to return home, a strange thing happened—a fully formed song came flowing through me. Looking up into the giant tree, I said, *'I'll bet this is your song*.'"

As the years passed, whenever I introduced *The Tree*, I would tell audiences that the author of the song was a Douglas fir, even though I only half-heartedly believed it myself. One day on the ferry to Orcas Island, I ran into an old friend. '*Are you coming to the celebration?*' he asked. '*After a ten-year struggle, the Madrona Point burial ground has finally been returned to the Lummi people.*'"

We went together, and after the feast my friend said the tribal chief wanted to hear *The Tree*. As I sang, the elders seemed riveted to each note and word. Later, I told the story of the song's origin and that I had always wondered if it really did come from that ancient Douglas fir. 'It did,' said the chief. 'I recognize the tune.' He then explained, 'It is known in our tradition that each tree has its own song. Our music comes from them. We show our respect for the great trees by singing their songs and playing them on the flute. We must all work to save the ancient groves in our territory.'"

Ever since that day, I have looked upon all living things in a new light. I humbly dedicate this book to its author, The Tree."

### PRELUDE This Is My Father's World

### **CALL TO WORSHIP**

Magnus, Miles, and Max Cole lead the Call to Worship this morning from Fauntleroy Park. Crush and rub a sprig of cedar or rosemary between your fingers and take in the aroma. Cedar is a sacred tree in this part of the world. Rosemary is a symbol of remembrance.

- L Come, Creator, Mother and Father of all, come unite with Earth community around the sacred tree of life, and help us remember anew:

  The first fresh breath of life, the first hint of your presence, the first song in the dawn that opened our souls to you and taught us to celebrate.
- C Come, help us remember!
- Come, compassionate Christ,
   come unite with all creation around the ancient tree of healing,
   and help us remember:
   The pains you feel among the suffering poor,
   the hurts you feel when Earth is wounded,
   the touch of your healing hands not only for the few long ago,
   but for all creations on Earth and for Earth.
- C Come, help us remember!
- Come, Spirit of life and breath,
  come unite with all that inhales oxygen from the first trees of life,
  and help us remember our breath:
  Our life from God, the first breath,
  our life through the trees of Earth,
  our life through the risen Christ,
  so that we may become agents of life as we breathe with all creation.
- C Come, help us remember!


### GATHERING HYMN In Sacred Manner May We Walk

This hymn by Susan Palo Cherwien, set to a tune by Thomas Pavlechko, traces its lineage to two primary sources: the Lakota teaching of the prophetic *White Buffalo Calf Woman* that human beings walk on Earth in a sacred manner; and the Biblical creation story from Genesis 1. While working toward a Master of Liberal Studies degree at Mundelein College, Ms. Cherwien took an interdisciplinary course entitled FATE OF THE EARTH, and set a goal of writing a hymn text that would reflect the key ideas of the course. She writes of the hymn:

"I began the text with the guidance that White Buffalo Calf Woman gave to the Lakota, to walk on Earth in a sacred manner, for Earth is sacred. I believe that, had the European settlers been open to the wisdom and knowledge of the Native American nations they were encountering, the Earth would not be in such danger. We can still learn from this wisdom, and so I began the hymn stanzas with the image of walking in a sacred manner. The stanzas move roughly in the order of the days of creation in the Genesis I creation story. Then I closed each stanza with a passage from the Bible: Exodus 3:5, Psalm 19:1, Psalm 96:12, Job 12:7, and Job 38:7. It was important for me to show that the interrelatedness and sacredness of all things are not outside of the Jewish and Christian traditions and scriptures. Now hopefully, we can sing those important thoughts into ourselves, into the world."

This morning, Minister of Music Jon Lackey introduces us to the hymn by singing the first two verses. The congregation joins in singing verses 3-6.



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#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

- P The Creator be with you.

- P Let us pray. Creator God,
- C Standing on holy ground, we are grounded in your creation and in your grace. Show us your presence in the trees and forests that surround us. Open our eyes to the communities they foster above and below the soil. Open our ears so that we might hear their songs. Teach us to walk with sacred manner on Earth, living our lives with loving intention, recognizing our relatedness to all living things. In the name of the Word become flesh, through whom all things were created and in whom all things hold together. Amen.


### **CONFESSION**

Our confession this season is framed by words from <u>Laudato Si'</u>, the circular letter from Pope Francis which invites all people into renewed care for our common home.

- P In his beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her.
- C We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air, and in all forms of life.
- P The Earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail."
- C We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the Earth; that our very bodies are made up of her elements: we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters. Forgive our forgetfulness, O God, and give us the will to treat our sister with respect, care, and gratitude.

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### **ABSOLUTION**

- P Sisters and Brothers, God hears our confession and offers us a way forward. In baptism we are grounded in grace, and equipped to be the Earthkeepers God has intended from the beginning.
- C Creator, teach us to love Earth as our home and restore us to our calling as peacemakers, servants, and keepers. Lord, teach us to care! Amen.

### FIRST READING: Ezekiel 14:1-8 The Inclusive Bible

In the final chapter of a book filled with indictments and judgments, the prophet offers a word of hope to God's people: When they own up to their misdeeds and turn back to God,

God will help them flourish once more.

<sup>1</sup>Listen, Israel: Come back to YHWH, your God. Your corruption has been your downfall! <sup>2</sup>Take words with you and turn to YHWH. Say to God, "Free us from our wrongdoing and accept our prayer. Instead of bulls, we offer you our lips. <sup>3</sup>Assyria cannot set us free. We will not ride on their horses. We will never again say "YHWH" to something our hands have made, for it is only from you that the orphaned find mercy."

<sup>4</sup> "I will heal their rebelliousness [says YHWH] and love them freely, for my anger against them as subsided.
