

FIRST READING: Romans 12:9-21

Paul presents benchmarks for faithful relationships with Christians and non-Christians. Love is the unflagging standard of our behavior. When we encounter evil, we do not resort to its tactics but seek to overcome it with good. While Christians cannot control the actions and attitudes of others, we seek to live at peace with all people.

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; ¹⁰love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. ¹¹Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. ¹²Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. ¹³Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers.

¹⁴Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. ¹⁵Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. ¹⁷Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. ¹⁸If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. ¹⁹Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." ²⁰No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." ²¹Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

- L The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the 16th Chapter.

GOSPEL: Matthew 16:21-28

After Peter confesses that Jesus is "The Messiah, the Son of the living God." Jesus reveals the ultimate purpose of his ministry. These words prove hard to accept even for a disciple whom Jesus has called "rock."

From that time on [after Peter's confession], Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. ²²And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." ²³But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

²⁴Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. ²⁶For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?

²⁷"For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. ²⁸Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom."

EUCHARISTIC PRAYER


- P We praise you for Jesus Christ who lived on Earth among us. His cloak was truth, his garments, life; to touch his hem brought healing.
- C On the night he was betrayed, we sought to strip him of those garments, but he stooped down and came to us as a servant.
- P And on that night, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, and gave it to his closest friends, saying:
- C Take and eat, this is my body broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me.
- P After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:
- C Drink from this, all of you; this cup is the new covenant in my blood, poured out for you and for all people for the forgiveness and healing. Do this in remembrance of me.
- P As body and blood were broken and poured, so bread and wine are broken and shared and we proclaim the mystery of our faith
- C Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again.
- P We pray for your presence, O God, and for the grace of your Holy Spirit to rest upon us and upon this bread and wine.
- C May we who receive this body and blood be Christ's body in the world, empowered by your spirit to weave new patterns of justice and truth, whole cloth to cover the naked and bind up the wounds of suffering, and garments of gladness to wear as a sign of your wondrous feast to come.
