#### CALL TO WORSHIP: ADSUM – I AM HERE


The Latin term "adsum" (pronounced: odd-soom), means "to be present, be near, be in attendance." Within this liturgy, it is akin to the Hebrew declaration, "hineni"—'Here I am,' a phrase from the Scriptures spoken in response to a call from the Divine. Both mean: You have my full attention; I am present and ready to respond to whatever it is you ask of me.


#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

#### CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

Our liturgy of confession today is framed by the hymn, <u>God Marked a Line</u>, text by Thomas Troeger, and by language borrowed from the 2017 Lutheran World Federation Assembly.

The name of the tune is DISTRESS.

- P The sewage smelling of our lack of concern.

- P Too often concentrating on our ability to buy rather than asking what we really need, what our world needs.
- C We confess our unfaithfulness,
- P not loving you with our whole heart and strength and mind.
- C Not loving our neighbors as ourselves, not caring for your creation.
- P Turn us from our cursed practices and our dependence on carbon to fuel them all.
- C Turn us toward a life that truly is life, of seeing our place within the whole, of caring for watersheds and habitats, of looking to the needs of others before ourselves, of following Jesus Christ, in whose name we pray. Amen.

#### FIRST READING: Isaiah 24:4-12

The prophet describes the consequences that ensue when the boundaries set by God are ignored. Earth herself suffers, along with the human species.

<sup>4</sup>The earth dries up and withers, the world languishes and withers; the heavens languish together with the earth. <sup>5</sup>The earth lies polluted under its inhabitants; for they have transgressed laws, violated the statutes, broken the everlasting covenant. <sup>6</sup>Therefore a curse devours the earth, and its inhabitants suffer for their guilt; therefore the inhabitants of the earth dwindled, and few people are left. <sup>7</sup>The wine dries up, the vine languishes, all the merry-hearted sigh. <sup>8</sup>The mirth of the timbrels is stilled, the noise of the jubilant has ceased, the mirth of the lyre is stilled. <sup>9</sup>No longer do they drink wine with singing; strong drink is bitter to those who drink it. <sup>10</sup>The city of chaos is broken down, every house is shut up so that no one can enter. <sup>11</sup>There is an outcry in the streets for lack of wine; all joy has reached its eventide; the gladness of the earth is banished. <sup>12</sup>Desolation is left in the city, the gates are battered into ruins.

<sup>21</sup>The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God.



We know this. And it is true.





# EXPLORE 10,000 YEAR OLD ROXHILL BOG ON JUNE 25th

Last summer, many of us gathered along the shore of the Duwamish River to learn about its ecosystem. This year we have arranged with the <u>Duwamish Alive Coalition</u> to take a GUIDED TOUR OF THE ROXHILL BOG ON <u>SATURDAY</u>, <u>JUNE 25</u>, from 10:00 to 11:30. The BOG serves as the headwaters of Longfellow Creek, a tributary of the Duwamish. Urbanization and climate change have caused damage to the urban watershed, and efforts are ongoing to restore the area. Our Duwamish Alive Coalition tour guides are also offering a <u>PRE-TOUR ZOOM on THURSDAY</u>, <u>JUNE 23</u>, at 7:00 <u>PM</u>. This will enable you to find out about the history of the bog and view a number of explanatory graphics before you take the tour. **You should have received an email with more details and directions for signing up for either or both of the events.** 

<u>During the second weekend of September</u>, we hope to participate in the restoration with our annual <u>God's Work Our Hands</u> project.
