### FIRST READING: Philippians 2:1-11

In his living and in his dying, Jesus is our model. As we empty ourselves of self-centered living, we can become whole-hearted servants to others.

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, <sup>2</sup>make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. <sup>3</sup>Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. <sup>4</sup>Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. <sup>5</sup>Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

<sup>6</sup> who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God

as something to be exploited,

<sup>7</sup> but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

#### **GOSPEL: Mark 12:28-34**

The reign of God is manifest when we love God and love our neighbors.

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, 'Which commandment is the first of all?' <sup>29</sup>Jesus answered, 'The first is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; <sup>30</sup>you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." <sup>31</sup>The second is this, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." There is no other

commandment greater than these.' <sup>32</sup>Then the scribe said to him, 'You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that "he is one, and besides him there is no other"; <sup>33</sup>and "to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength", and "to love one's neighbor as oneself",—this is much more important than all whole burnt-offerings and sacrifices.' <sup>34</sup>When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' After that no one dared to ask him any question.

- C Embolden us to connect ourselves to all who are de-humanized by hurtful words and actions.
- A You endow us with a variety of gifts, and you make our mission very clear to love our neighbors as ourselves.
- C Let our ears be open to those who are adversely impacted by prejudice, and then let their stories pierce our hearts in a way that takes us beyond only good intentions.
- A As we enter into the hottest time of year in our northern hemisphere, made more severe by climate change, we pray for life-saving protections for all whose lives are affected disproportionately by the extreme heat.
- C Keep safe the incarcerated, the farm laborers, those living without shelter, and those crowded into urban ghettos.
- A We give you thanks, O God, for all the life that surrounds us people, animals, and everything that exists in the natural world. Where there is good news in our worldwide community, let there be rejoicing; where there is struggle, bring your hope; where there is disease, bring your healing; and where there is dying, bring the promise of new life.


