### **CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS** Please rise in body or spirit.


P Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were called at baptism. Within the community of the church, God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor, and be reconciled with God and with one another.


Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

### FIRST READING: Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14

Israel celebrated its deliverance from slavery in Egypt by keeping the festival of Passover. This festival included the slaughter, preparation, and eating of the Passover lamb, whose blood protected God's people from the threat of death. The early church described the Lord's Supper using imagery from the Passover.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: <sup>2</sup>This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup>Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. <sup>4</sup>If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it.

<sup>11</sup>This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. <sup>12</sup>For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup>The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

<sup>14</sup>This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

## SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 11:17, 20-34

In all of Paul's letters, the only story from the life of Jesus that he recounts in detail is this report of the last supper. Here he warns the Corinthians that examining their behavior—how they treat each other as members of the same community for whom Christ died—is paramount. The meal is meant to unify under Christ's Lordship, not stratify according to the world's definition of who deserves divine access. His words to the Corinthian community are reflected in the liturgies of churches throughout the world.


<sup>17</sup> Now in the following instructions I do not commend you, because when you come together it is not for the better but for the worse. <sup>20</sup>When you come together, it is not really to eat the Lord's supper. <sup>21</sup>For when the time comes to eat, each of you goes ahead with your own supper, and one goes hungry and another becomes drunk. <sup>22</sup>What! Do you not have homes to eat and drink in? Or do you show contempt for the church of God and humiliate those who have nothing? What should I say to you? Should I commend you? In this matter I do not commend you! <sup>23</sup> For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, <sup>24</sup> and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' 25In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' <sup>26</sup>For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. <sup>27</sup> Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord. <sup>28</sup>Examine yourselves, and only then eat of the bread and drink of the cup. <sup>29</sup>For all who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgement against themselves. <sup>30</sup>For this reason many of you are weak and ill, and some have died. <sup>31</sup>But if we judged ourselves, we would not be judged. <sup>32</sup>But when we are judged by the Lord, we are disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world. <sup>33</sup> So then, my brothers and sisters, when you come together to eat, wait for one another. <sup>34</sup>If you are hungry, eat at home, so that when you come together, it will not be for your condemnation. About the other things I will give instructions when I come.

### THE GOSPEL: John 13:1-17, 33-35

The story of the last supper in John's gospel presents a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere.

Jesus performs the duty of a slave, washing the feet of his disciples

and urging them to do the same for each other.

- P The Holy Gospel according to John, the 13th Chapter.
- C Glory to you, O Lord.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. <sup>2</sup>The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper <sup>3</sup>Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, <sup>4</sup>got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. <sup>5</sup>Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. <sup>6</sup>He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" <sup>7</sup>Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." <sup>8</sup>Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." <sup>9</sup>Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" <sup>10</sup>Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." <sup>11</sup>For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

<sup>12</sup>After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? <sup>13</sup>You call me Teacher and Lord and you are right, for that is what I am. <sup>14</sup>So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup>For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. <sup>16</sup>Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. <sup>17</sup>If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

<sup>33</sup>Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Judeans so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' <sup>34</sup>I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. <sup>35</sup>By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."


#### FOOT-WASHING AND PRAYER GARDEN



Hosanna in the highest!


### **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER**

- P You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God.
- C You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory.
- P You so loved the world that you gave your only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life.
- C We give you thanks for his coming into the world to fulfill for us your holy will and to accomplish all things for our salvation.
- P In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying:
- C Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.
- P Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:

- C This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.
- P For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.
- C Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.
- P Remembering, therefore, his salutary command, his life-giving passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension, and the promise of his coming again, we give thanks to you, O Lord God Almighty,
- C not as we ought but as we are able;
- P we ask you mercifully to accept our praise and thanksgiving and with your Word and Holy Spirit to bless us, your servants, and these your own gifts of bread and wine,
- C so that we and all who share in the body and blood of Christ may be filled with heavenly blessing and grace,
- P and, receiving the forgiveness of sin, may be formed to live as your holy people
- C and be given our inheritance with all your saints.
- P To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.
- C Amen.
- P Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:
- Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread.

  Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.










### HOLY WEEK

Plan now to join us for the Three Days - Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Vigil – one service!

Maundy Thursday, April 6, 7:00 pm, we observe Jesus serving his disciples in foot-washing, which points to the giving of his life on the cross. Foot-washing stations and a prayer garden with activities for children will be followed by the celebration of the Eucharist. Worship continues with the stripping of the altar, which prepares us for the next portion of the service on Good Friday.

Good Friday, April 7, 7:00 pm, we focus on the cross with the reading of the Passion story from John, from which we learn that the cross was the hour of Jesus' glory. The Bidding Prayer then collects the needs of all the people and circumstances for which Christ died. In the lighting of candles during the Prayer around the Cross, we offer our individual petitions to One who is Light in the darkness of our world.

Easter Vigil, April 8, 7:00 pm, is the final part of this service. We remind ourselves of the great acts of God's rescue throughout history, leading to Jesus' victory over death. We light a new fire on the patio, we remember our baptism which connects us with the death and resurrection of Christ, and we celebrate the Eucharist.
