FIRST READING: Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14

To the community for whom this passage was written, it seemed as though the oppression they were experiencing would never end. Daniel's message is: Indeed, it shall end. The Ancient One who is judge will call all nations to account and will give dominion to God's people who are represented by "one like a human being."

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne, his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire.

¹⁰A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence.

A thousand thousands served him,

and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him.

The court sat in judgment, and the books were opened.

¹³As I watched in the night visions,

I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven.

And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him.

¹⁴To him was given dominion and glory and kingship,

that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him.

His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 4:1-7, 11-13

After reminding the church at Ephesus of God's gift of grace in Christ Jesus, Paul reminds them of their calling: to be a community united in faith and dedicated in hope to utilizing their gifts to build up the church in love.

¹I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ²with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, ⁵one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. ⁷But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. ¹¹The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, ¹²to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, ¹³until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.



GOSPEL: John 18:33-37

In John's gospel, the story of Jesus and Pilate presents two different ways of exercising power: through force or with love.

Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" ³⁴Jesus answered, "Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?" ³⁵Pilate replied, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?" ³⁶Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." ³⁷Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."



EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

THE LORD'S PRAYER (ecumenical)


- P Lord, remember us in your kingdom, and teach us to pray:


INVITATION TO COMMUNION



THIS WEEK'S ACT FOR CREATION				

Often Thanksgiving dinner produces plenty of "leftovers." Sometimes we eat them all up. Other times, we end up tossing them out later because we can't face another turkey sandwich. But thought of another way, those are really just "ingredients" for other meals, right? Make it easier to use all the fresh produce you prepare for the big meal, for instance, by cooking them simply, with less seasoning at the get-go, and then tossing them with dressings and sauces. That way, you can reimagine how to use those leftovers for days, so long as you have some pasta or rice in the pantry or leafy greens in the fridge. Pro tip: label your leftovers with the name and best-by date. The US Department of Agriculture recommends eating foods with cooked meat or seafood within four days; vegetarian foods keep longer.
